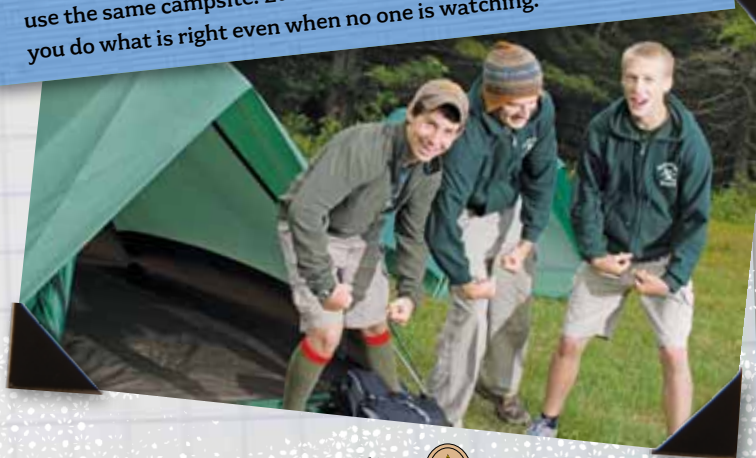


Group Size

Managers of many campgrounds, forests, and parks place limits on the number of people who can travel and camp together. This lessens the impact on the land and on the experience of others who might be hiking and camping there, too. For these reasons, you should respect rules on group size. If no more than eight people are to be in a group, this doesn't mean a troop of 24 can travel in three patrols and then use the same campsite. Ethical decision-making shines through as you do what is right even when no one is watching.
